Mick started by outlining the scale of the problem, which is very alarming: there were an incredible 24,863 Cyber-crimes reported to Action Fraud in 2022/23 reporting a whopping total of £12.3 million lost! The average loss is £1500! This includes attacks on private individuals but also big businesses including the Critical National Infrastructure. The snag

Mick repeated the ABC many times to keep yourself safe: **Never Assume, Never Believe and Always Confirm.**


Never feel afraid to ring off and call a number you trust, if possible, on a different phone. Once you have rung off, talk to other people and see what they think about what is happening

and what you are being asked to do! Consult a family member, neighbour or friend, don't let the scammers frighten you with keeping the transactions secret or feel under pressure to act quickly!! Just take your time! If it really is the Bank they will appreciate you taking care, making checks and protecting yourself. Protect yourself by making passwords at least 12 characters long and don't use obvious names or birth dates as this makes your password harder to crack by the criminals. Then, never tell anyone your passwords!! Mick described some of the scams being used at the moment and some new ones too.

Just remember your ABCs and feel stronger to protect yourself from cyber scams:

Never Assume, Never Believe, Always Confirm and don't let anyone rush you into anything.

Parish Council News

Well, I missed the first few minutes because there was an interview prior to the meeting for the new applicant, which I couldn't attend, and it couldn't have gone on too long because they started the proper meeting well on time.

So, we have a new Parish Councillor, Dawn Hunn, who is of course recycled as she's been on before. She is currently the youngest on the council.

Cornwall councillor Long was present, looking very casual. He apologised for his attire but explained that he had had a fall from his lorry at work and has broken his humerus in eight places, meaning he can only wear shorts and a sling.

He talked about a few things and then came the burning question from Councillor Fry – where have all the planings gone from the hall car park? The hall committee have been very grateful to a local contractor who let them have some, a few times actually. But then someone from the shop looked out and Cormac were sweeping them all up. He questioned the driver who said it was at the request of the said committee, which it was not!

Councillor Long is to ask if they can be returned asap. Obviously a mix up.

The planning that the council recommended for approval, but many didn't know where it was, has been turned down by Cornwall council as it's a notable building or something. This caused a bit of a dilemma, they said it was old, well it's certainly been around a while, long enough to start to have seen better days. Does "been around a long time" make it special or useless?

Jim had written to the Glebe to ask if they would consider selling a bit of a field to make a car park. The council said it wasn't worth discussing if they said "no". They didn't say "no", they said it would be market value and please send a map of where it was with an X on the spot.

Councillor Long is to be approached with regard to money for the junior goal posts from the Community chest. The conditions attached to any grant application make it impossible to continue with that approach.

Then we got back onto the gate through the hedge into the field – again. Chairman Cox had approached the shop, who voted for it, because they think it's dangerous for children to walk around the end of the wall and back up through the car park to buy things.

The shop said they thought it might be difficult to get a grant to put a gate through someone else's hedge (The National Trust's), but they would see. As no one actually knew what the National Trust thought about it, or whether it would have to be wide enough for disabled access etc. they said they would need to meet the National Trust representative. Councillor Greene who is very keen on the idea said there was no need for everyone to trail along and she would meet the rep. Councillor Wenmoth, who isn't very keen on the idea, on behalf of the Parish Hall, thought that more people should go than one, and eventually it was sort of agreed to have a subcommittee. And then a very strange unique thing happened. When Chairman Cox asked who would like to be on the subcommittee, and the answer is always "none", all except two put up their hands. Councillor Greene was very displeased by everyone's negative attitude and I don't know what the outcome was.

Funnily enough South West Water don't agree with the Council's settlement offer on the bill, and Jim doesn't agree with them, so that's not settled either. (They are asking for £1000 for water that no one knew they had).

Lastly councillor Potter brought up the shop sign out on the pavement which has been quite controversial. He said that the shop wanted a gate because it was too dangerous to walk around the end of the hedge, and now they had to walk around the sign as well. Councillor Wilkins said, I think, that it wasn't in anyone's way and Councillor Greene said it had attracted ten extra customers.

Gardening Ideas

In July you should be enjoying some of the fruits of your labour and eating crops such as courgettes, lettuce, spring onions, shallots, broad beans and peas. By the end of July and into August runner beans may be ready, remember to keep picking them regularly to prevent them from becoming tough and this will encourage the plants to produce more beans and prolong your harvesting period. Take growing tips off the beans when they reach the top of their supports and this will encourage side shoots lower down preventing the plants from becoming top heavy, meaning the beans will be in reach.

When the broad bean harvest is over cut plants at ground level, compost the tops but leave the roots in the ground to produce

nitrogen and therefore improve the soil fertility for future crops. This applies to all legumes.

Fruits such as strawberries, gooseberries and blackcurrants should be ripening. Remember not to overharvest rhubarb now, leave plenty of stems and leaves on the plants to feed, therefore strengthen the plants for next year.

July can be one of the hottest months of the year, it's a great time to spend some time relaxing and enjoying your outside space but there are some extra precautions to be aware of in hot dry weather, such as:

- Mulch around plants/shrubs to retain moisture.
- With regard to your flowers if it's very hot keep your pots/containers damp to keep the roots cool
- Don't let pots/containers/hanging baskets dry out
- Continue to save rainwater and suitable grey water. Water plants early mornings or evenings to prevent evaporation
- Hoe off weeds and leave them to dry in the sun.

French marigolds are an excellent plant to grow both in the flower garden and the veg plot as companion plants. They attract bees, butterflies and other pollinators and beneficial insects into your garden. Increased pollination means higher yields. With their strong scent marigolds area also a natural form of pest control to deter such pests as spider mite, white fly and aphids. By deadheading them regularly they will continue to flower until the first frosts occur. In fact, dead head all your perennial and bedding plants to encourage new flowers and extend the flowering period. This includes penstemon, delphiniums, hardly geraniums — cut them all back after the first flowers begin to fade


to encourage more blooms. Pick your sweet peas regularly for the same reason.

Other insect loving plants include lavender, nasturtiums, cornflowers, buddleia, golden rod and Michaelmas daisies.

In your greenhouse keep on top of side shoots on tomatoes, and remove leaves below the first ripening fruit to aid ventilation and prevent spread of disease and pests, such as red spider mite. If hot mist the plants and if possible, stand pots on a wet surface to maintain humidity. You might need to

consider the use of shade paint on the greenhouse glass where necessary. Check regularly for signs of the previously mentioned whitefly, spider mite and also mealy bugs!

Bats are most active in the summer, dusk being a good time to look out for them hunting insects over your garden. By growing insect loving plants and creating log piles you will encourage insects and this, in turn, will encourage bats and birds such as swallows, house martins and swifts.



In July the ground may become dry and harder for birds such as blackbirds, thrushes and robins to source worms so continue to supply food such as sunflower hearts, fruit, cooked pasta, rice and mealworms. It's important to keep feeding the birds to maintain energy levels after breeding and feeding young, also don't forget there are more birds about as the young ones mature.

Keep birdbaths and ponds topped up and ensure there is a source of water for other wildlife such as hedgehogs which will be breeding in the summer. Also please clean your bird feeders/baths to prevent a build up of bacteria.

Please be careful, or don't do it, when strimming, there are hedgehogs around. They could easily be maimed. If you disturb their nests, maybe in logs piles or under sheds, they might abandon their young if frightened.


Remember that in the wild all forms of life are connected with

one species depending on another. Try to grow some plants that flower mid to late September, examples are buddleia, lavender and roses to supply nectar for butterflies and moths. Its interesting to take part in the Big Butterfly Count (11 July – 4th August). When you grow all these shrubs and trees in your garden you will be helping to combat global warming as all plants take in carbon dioxide and produce oxygen via photosynthesis



therefore improving our atmosphere.

So, create a log pile, a compost heap and dig a pond. Your wildlife will thank you for it.



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The Parish Church of St Dominic - New Church Warden

Our very own Cornish-born Jessop Price was admitted as a St Dominic Church Warden at the Archdeacon of Bodmin's Visitation (the Venerable Kelly Betteridge) held at Landulph Church on Monday 03 June 2024. The 'encirclement' of Church Wardens for the East Wivelshire Deanery (comprising 19 parishes) were all present and presided over by the Revd Michael Johnson, Rural Dean.

Did you know you lived in one of the ancient parishes of East Wivelshire?

If you study the internet, you will find the area was formed before the Norman Conquest in Anglo Saxon times, and is clearly marked in the Domesday Book of 1086 AD. Today, the area covers southeast Cornwall along the lower reaches of the Tamar as far north as Launceston. The census reports it has a population of about 71,000.

What will be Jessop's responsibilities as Church Warden?

Together with Clare Lee, he will be an officer of the Bishop of Truro and a senior lay representative of St Dominick Parish to manage, maintain and lead the Parish by example.

What are his qualifications to become a Church Warden of this Parish?

Well, for those of you who have not had the opportunity to read his memoires "The International Plumber", he is the grandson of a church warden at St Helen's Ashby-de-la-Zouch, as was an uncle at St Paul's Winchester, and his father was a priest. A chorister, choral scholar and deputy vicar choral — what more could be more inviting!

The Village Community Shop has proven to be a real boost to Village life in St Dominick. Our Church, over the centuries, has also been a centre for everyone living in the Parish.
