

'Sir Richard Edgcumbe of Cotehele' - St Dominick WI September meeting.

On Wednesday 11th September St. Dominick WI welcomed our guest speaker Jim Wadman, Jim's talk was entitled 'Sir **Richard Edgcumbe of** Cotehele'. Jim set the scene of his talk with some Tudor music and he told us about the turbulent times in Tudor England during the 15th Century with Civil War raging across the land. It was a fascinating period in our history and Jim unpicked it for us very



well, whilst bringing in the link with Cotehele and it's intriguing connection to the King at the time, Henry VII, who lived from

1485 - 1509 and Sir Richard Edgecumbe of Cotehele, who lived from about 1443 to 1489.

We learnt about the Feudal system under Henry VII and the strife between the Houses of Lancaster and York, followed by the unification between the two Houses and the creation of the Tudor Rose which was purposely designed by Henry VII to show a combination of the Red Rose of Lancaster and the White Rose of York. We heard about the Battle of Bosworth and Richard Edgcumbe being knighted by the new king on the battlefield on 22nd August 1485 for his loyalty and for supplying men at arms. Richard Edgcumbe rose in status and power throughout the next few years, becoming High Sheriff of Devon on the 5th November 1486 and Privy Councillor in 1487. A very interesting character that Jim described was Lady Margaret Beaufort, mother of Henry VII, who was a skilful and resolute matriarch of the Lancastrians. She was married, had a baby and was widowed by the age of 14!

During Sir Richard Edgcumbe's last mission, a diplomatic one to negotiate a truce with Anne, Duchess of Brittany, he died at Morlaix on the 8th September 1489, aged about 46. He was buried in the local church but his tomb was destroyed during the French Revolution. It has now been restored.

We now have a flavour of the turbulent Tudor times in which Sir Richard Edgcumbe of Cotelele lived and died.

Our next WI meeting will be on Wednesday 9th October. The speaker will be Professor Edwards and the talk is entitled 'The Death of Venice'. We meet at 7.30 in the Parish Hall and visitors are welcome. We charge £5 for a visitor for the evening.

Parish Council Report September 2024

This meeting was very cosy because the meeting was held in the Chapel room, where it had not been held for some time as the Parish Hall was unavailable. I think all councillors were present, no Andrew Long.

The Chairman thanked everyone for coming. There was no WIFI so he had sent all relevant documents around earlier, which he does anyway, but with a special note to read them. Clerk Jim asked whether anyone ever wanted all the planning on view anyway as other councils didn't do this. Obviously, everyone studies it online each month, also the minutes are circulated prior to each meeting, so was there any point? There were mumblings about this, it would certainly be quicker, but councillor Wilkins pointed out that if there was anything that was unclear having it on the screen would help the discussion. As it happened there was one planning item that fell into this category, chairman Cox brought it up on his laptop, it was discussed and still appeared unclear, so I don't know where that leaves anyone.

The planning application for knocking a hole through the hall car park hedge came up, but the council were advised not to comment on this, being the applicants. Councillor Greene had the costings of the gate and work, plus volunteers, which is to be discussed another time. I have to say there is a mixed reception to this. Some are wildly enthusiastic; others were looking as if they'd landed in another universe. I don't think the public have commented but not sure.

The old sign is to remain in Lovell's field saying "No kite flying" Although there are six new ones, the old tatty wobbly one is bigger.

What has happened to the proposed voluntary annual work party that was supposed to maintain the heritage Trail footpath? It seems to have been forgotten about, and now the signs are buried in the hedges in places, the Chairman is to sort it out!

The car parking area for twenty-five or so cars, which possibly might be able to be purchased from the Glebe is going to cost many thousands of pounds to implement. In the absence of any grant funding around, at the moment, it is on the back burner, not forgotten.

Now the football goal posts. After a very long discussion and lots of talk about measurements etc because the area isn't big enough to have a regulation junior pitch, the decision was taken to have a small pitch with two posts. The vote was seven for two posts, two for one post and one for no posts at all.

The football club asked if the Parish Council owned an old roller that was at the field as they wanted to get rid of it. After discussion it was decided this belonged to the defunct cricket club, and then they had to decide if anyone from that institution was still around. Anyway, the parish council don't own it. Then they started to say they could sell it and have the money towards something else, even though it didn't belong to them, like real politicians! As the football club were only asking, I suppose the answer is no, it's not theirs.

Then we went onto the Code of Conduct training that they all have to do. It's online now, so easy. No one could remember, apart from Councillors Brady and Hunn, who have just done theirs, if they've ever done it or not, some thought they had. Then no one knew if it was compulsory every two years or advisory. Do you know, I don't think anyone looked as if they cared, well, perhaps one did?

Lastly, we discussed the Water Bill. Believe it or not, the council are unable to get an up to date bill from SWWA. Apparently, there should have been no VAT on it, and SWWA should have been notified of this when they sent the first bill. Someone, who must live underground, said they had never had a bill but the clerk did point out there had been loads, all for the wrong amount. So it continues. Apparently, the tenant doesn't need much water at this time of year, he's struggled through the summer all dry. And at the very end, we had the figures. Well, the totals are correct but there must have been a slippage somewhere as the workings are looking completely wrong. I do believe this is a "paper" error and poor Jim was sent away to put it all right.


On Saturday 7th December in the Village Hall there will be a Flower Demonstration given by Mandy Nicholson.

How to be part of this lovely Village Event


(initiated by The Who'd during lockdown)

As before, each participating household will have their December date on which to display their decorated window (on the map) and to remain up and lit until the end of the month for everyone to have time to view all the entries.



Lots of new things have been happening in the Shop in September so it has been busy, busy for the team...

In early September, our long-awaited hot drinks machine arrived offering a range of coffees – americano, cappuccino, espresso etc - tea & hot chocolate. There is a coffee loyalty card on offer too so for every 9 coffees bought, you get the 10th free. We got great feedback on the 'try before you buy' day so do treat yourself when you are next in Shop – just £2.25 for coffee & chocolate and £1.50 for tea.

Also last month, we brought in Kernow Fresh as a new supplier that make a range of fresh sandwiches, rolls & wraps. They top up the fridge 3 times a week with a good selection and a variety of fillings including vegetarian options. A new printing service also rolled out. We can print or copy documents in A4 & A3 in colour or black & white on a 72-hour turn round service. There are more details available in the Shop including prices. From September 20th, the fish van moved its time forward half an hour from 10.00 to 10.30 and now that is the new regular time for the Friday fortnightly visit so, please make a note it's **now 10.30-11.30**.

Fridays 4th & 18th October - the Pengelly's fish van will be in the car park **at the new time of 10.30 – 11.30** offering their normal great range of fresh fish. If you cannot collect your fish from the van during the time it is here, we are happy to keep it in the bottom of one of our fridges so you can collect later in the day.

Every Friday – the Post Office service is available between 9.00-12.00 midday. A reminder that you can withdraw or deposit money in your bank account as well as posting letters and parcels.

Every Saturday – you can get hot pasties – steak, steak & gravy, cheese & onion and sausage rolls from our pasty warmer between 10.00-1.00pm. If you would like to order in advance, please let one of our Volunteers know by no later than 5.30pm on the Thursday before.

Support St Dominick Farming Community

Government continues to encourage us to eat healthily and reduce our carbon footprint whenever possible. We are a farming community with many farms and small holdings within the Parish. We need all our farms to be healthy and productive to support not only all our needs (whether this is dairy, vegetables or meat from local livestock) but also to allow them to expand their operations outside our Parish. By supporting our farming community in everything they do, it should help to make our environment as perfect as possible so that our families and their descendants can live in St Dominick for another 700 years.

Please can we all make a concerted effort to support both the Harvest Festival in the Parish Church on Sunday 13th October at 10am, and the Harvest Supper in the Village Hall on the evening of Monday 14th October.

Let me tell you a harvest supper story about another agricultural community where parishioners were definitely divided into two 'social sectors'; the village wealthies and those who worked the land. A former Chairman of the merchant bank C. Hoare & Co (founded in 1672), Geoffrey Leonard Hoare, lived in the village with his wife, Lady Alma. She was of Irish stock and blessed with a fiery temperament. Lady Alma's sister-in-law, Molly Hoare, lived in a cottage adjacent to the Church at the top of the very picturesque Village Green. She was different in every way from Lady Alma. Rumour had it, she had been a nurse in the Boer War; she never married and had a heart of gold. There was one flaw in her character, mutually shared with Lady Alma; the sisters-in-law were in permanent 'family hate' mode.

The annual harvest supper was attended by most of the village, including Lady Alma and Molly. The vicar was in charge of these happy occasions. He decided one year, in order to keep the peace between these two 'genteel' aristocratic ladies, they should sit on either side of him. The evening was going well; good food and good company. The evening ends with a brief speech by the vicar to thank God for the year's harvest and a special thank you to all those kind people who made the evening so enjoyable. He rose to his feet and started his yearly rhetoric with "What a wonderful evening we have had. Do you know" he then looked down to his left and then to his right, "I think this is the first time I have ever sat between two Hoares.". His short valediction did not phase his chosen guests, and his speech continued as though nothing had happened - but the face of the vicar's wife was a picture. She was my mother!"





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Gardening and Nature Notes

As Autumn progresses there are still plenty of jobs to be done in the garden.

Continue to look after any vegetables that you have grown to be used during the colder months, such as leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, kale and brussel sprouts. It is often said that brassicas such as these taste better after a bit of frost.

When your runner bean or French bean harvest is complete, remove any supports and cut the plants off just above the ground level leaving the roots in the ground to help with nitrogen fixation in the soil. However, if you plan to save any bean seeds for next year it is best to leave the seed pods to dry on the plant; when the pods are dry and crisp remove the bean seeds, dry them and store in an envelope or airtight container, with a label to tell you the variety next year.

Continue to add any spent plant material to your compost pile in order to have useable compost for next season.


In the flower garden it is a good time to plant spring flowering bulbs and this will ensure an early source of nectar for pollinators next year. Try to include some early flowering bulbs such as snowdrops/crocus/grape hyacinths.

If you have been growing spring flowering plants from seed, such as sweet Williams and wallflowers they can be transplanted now into their final flowering positions and they will become established before winter, but remember. if you are planting your bulbs or plants into containers. to raise these containers slightly above ground level to allow drainage and prevent them from becoming waterlogged over winter.

Climbing and rambling roses can also be pruned once they have finished flowering but try to leave some flowers for form hips for bird food in the winter, sunflowers can also be left to go to seed and become a valuable food source.

If nature has supplied you with a good apple harvest why not store some in order to be able to put a few out each week during the winter to feed birds such as blackbirds and thrushes. Reports around the parish are generally that the birds have had a good nesting season, lots of young house martins, swallows and robins this year.

If you have been growing squashes and pumpkins remember to harvest them in time for Halloween.




Continue to leave out water and suitable food for hedgehogs as they will need fattening up before they go into hibernation in late autumn/early winter. Maybe supply them with some shelter, such as a hedgehog house.

Most of all try to spend some leisure time in your garden enjoying the late autumn sunshine and colours and continue to garden with wildlife in mind.
