
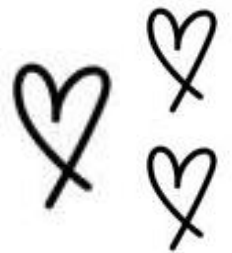

Parish Council Report December 2024

This meeting was a bit later in the month and I can't remember why but as there was no meeting in January it didn't matter. Not much came up that was new so this might be an update, or not, on the previous meeting.

Councillor Long was in attendance this time, the planning for the site next to the Meadows, which started beyond memory, received an objection regarding the application, which was upheld so it has to go back to the planning committee again. I can't tell you what it was, the whole thing has been a bit shambolic. If anyone is interested it's probably on the planning online, but I'm not sure.

Councillor Long repeated the warnings about overnight closures of the Saltash tunnel and ongoing work, so you are all to allow extra time to get to Plymouth.

He, parish councillors and police had had a meeting with regard to vehicles parking on the pavement around the village. The result was that it was fortunate that in the country people all knew and helped each other and worked together as parking on the pavement is now a part of life, otherwise emergency vehicles have no access to lots of places. With regard to potholes there are 7,500 miles of road with potholes in, that's a lot. Speeding came up as well, councillor Fry said vehicles passed his house at 30 mph! Now, if you know where he lives that's impressive and they shouldn't do it, nor follow their satnavs.

The junior goal posts have arrived, councillor Fry offered to see to them last month but he has been extremely busy with his advent window, which was very good and also the Chairman and secretary of the football club who will have input, have been very busy as they are turkey producers. After Christmas will be quieter.

The "Welcome to St Dominick" sign has been cleaned by a parishioner who didn't know Councillor Fry was on the case, so thank you to Gideon. Not sure of his method. Also to his wife

Penny, who decorated the bus shelter with the poppy art this year whilst Sam was indisposed.

A parishioner has asked for permission regarding a new community orchard, perhaps in Lovells. A few ideas were discussed but it was thought the person wanted to plan it himself, but he wasn't there so it was a bit vague. I think it was left he would be put in touch with the person who started the last one for input on such things as how it progressed, or not and where it is now etc. Most of the trees previously planted at Lovells are dead or stunted, if they ever lived at all. I think there was only one objector on the council to the plan in general but they really wanted to see the person involved.

A parishioner has also offered to do a "start" sign for Lovells, very public spirited.

The proposed flooding of Haye Marsh again was on the agenda but as there is no official proposal there was nothing to discuss. Some older residents will remember the action group to fight the plan last time SODITT. Save our Dyke in the Tamar. The council backed the objection last time when Councillor Wenmoth was the chairman, but people might feel differently now. Farming land is not valued as it once was. Anyway, until there is an application..... The National Trust withdrew their application last time, they said their plan was not viable, but this might not be the same. Councillor Greene said that councillor Potter was so pleased last time he bought everyone a drink- did he?

The National Trust also would like dog bins and "no fouling" at Bohetheric. The signs were agreed to but bins aren't possible as

the council won't empty any more, this is why there are no more around the village.

With regard to dog fouling/dogs, new strict signs are to be put up at Lovell's stating "No dogs, not even dogs on leads" or similar, as people are flouting the regulations.

And lastly Councillor Brown's questionnaire might be in this month's parish News, I can't remember the questions but you will see them. please answer, they are in your own interest.

Next meeting **7.00pm Parish Hall 5th February**. All welcome. You ought to come sometime, as in May all of these people will be up for re-election and if there's a competition you will need to vote, something that hasn't happened for several years!

Gardening and Nature Notes

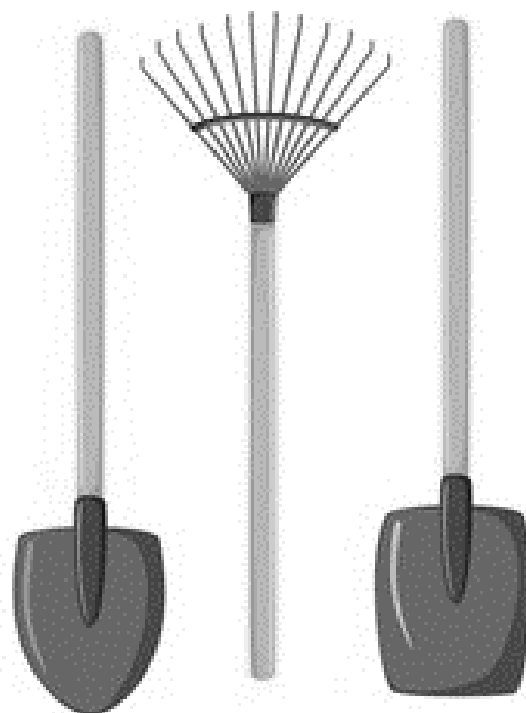
February is the month when a lot of gardeners begin to plan for the coming season and purchase seeds etc for sowing in the coming months.

Seed potatoes should be available now and could be put in seed trays or old egg boxes to “chit”. Put them into the egg boxes with the end upwards that has the most eyes. They should be stored in the light in frost free conditions and then strong green shoots will form and this will give them a good start when they are planted out next month.

In the greenhouse broad beans, peas and sweet peas can be sown into pots or modules ready for planting out when the soil warms up in a few weeks’ time but do remember to protect them from mice until they have germinated. Also, onions and leeks can be planted.

If you have a heated propagator or even a warm windowsill then seeds such as tomatoes, peppers, lettuce, cucumbers, broccoli and cauliflower can be sown towards the end of the month.

If you own a greenhouse and if you haven’t already done so, now is a good time to give it a spring clean - including cleaning the glass again after winter. Cloches could also be cleaned and put in place to help the soil to warm up prior to planting. Any pots and trays that you plan to re-use should be



washed now to prevent any chance of disease.

When ordering seeds and plants for spring and summer bedding try to include varieties such as marigolds, cosmos, lavender, dahlias and nasturtiums that will be good for the bees and other pollinators. Also growing plants such as foxgloves, primroses, grape hyacinths, forget-me-nots and champions will provide a great source of nectar for butterflies and bees when they flower later in the year.

It is important to continue to feed the birds with high energy, high fat foods during this time as lot of the berries and natural foods will have been eaten by now helped by the visiting redwings and fieldfares. Late winter is the time to clean out existing bird nest boxes and if possible, erect new ones.

One good way to help wildlife in winter is by not to be too tidy and leaving piles of leaves, log piles and compost heaps undisturbed as shelter for small mammals, amphibians and insects. It is important to remember that wildlife has never needed us more than they do today. Having said that, and we do love all wildlife, we don't necessarily need to have it in our own garden and there does seem to be a proliferation of moles at the moment. You are privileged if they come to you as it means you have plenty of worms. However, worms are available elsewhere and we would be interested if you emailed the parish news with suggestions regarding relocation. I still have the upturned empty plastic milk bottles on canes rattling around in the mole hill holes. This does look a bit strange but seems to be fairly effective, not 100% but not bad.

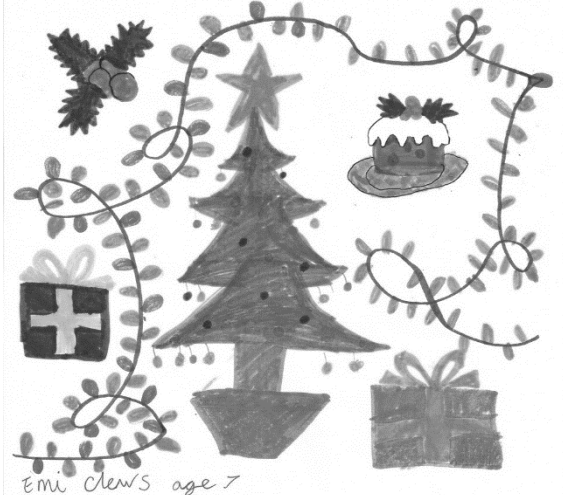

St Dominic Parish Church

The life of the Church was as busy as usual with a range of Services in the last couple of months starting with the Remembrance Day Civil Service when members of the Parish remembered those that fought in previous wars, with wreaths and crosses being positioned by various village organisations at the war memorial within the building. Apart from our regular Services, we celebrated the birth of Christ by uniting with the Methodist congregation for the Carol Service led by Rev Andy Atkins; he also led the popular Christingle on Christmas Eve starting Christmas on a high note with many from the village attending on one or both occasions to celebrate one of the highlights of the Christian year.

The primary school children, staff and supporters, as part of the Church family, were welcomed for their Christmas and Remembrance Services.

Once again the Parochial Church Council, PCC, supported other charities and sent the collection money from the Remembrance and Christingle services to the Royal British Legion (£100) and The Children's Society (£328) respectively. We also had our annual appeal amounting to £50 for St Petrocs which helps the homeless of Cornwall. In addition some money was sent digitally to these charities. We hope that even more will be raised next time for those less fortunate than ourselves.

The village windows were lit up with scenes from Carols to make an Advent Calendar, it was lovely that so many families made the effort to take part in this event and quite a few walked down to the special one to sing to the cows. Thank you to the organiser who also designed many of the non voting windows.

We are very grateful to all of the retired priests and worship leaders who continue to take the Services in the Church and the Chapel at Halton Quay (part of the Parish) which enables us to continue with a recurrent pattern of Worship, details in the diary section. Rev. Andy has now organised his rota so that he takes Services in each of the Churches in the Kit Hill area on a regular basis.

The PCC were delighted that the Christmas Craft Fair raised over £4000 for Church funds; whilst this helps us to maintain the Church for the people of the village, so many local craftsmen also benefit from having an opportunity to sell their goods to many visitors from the surrounding area. Thank you to the team who organise and run the event.

By the time you read this Will Keating and friends will have performed a candlelit concert in the Church; however on March

28th the Callington Community Gospel Choir will sing in the Church, further details will be available next month. The profit from both of these concerts will help maintain the historic building for the future.
