



#### St Dominick WI - Mercy Ships.

On Wednesday 12th of March St Dominick WI welcomed our speaker Ruth Croome who told us about the incredible work that is carried out by two amazing vessels called the Mercy Ships. These ships, named The Africa Mercy and The Global Mercy, are hospital ships that take free surgery and vital medical care to sub-Saharan Africa, where 9 out of 10 people don't have access to safe surgery. The ships dock in ports around the African coast for up to a year bringing hope and healing to families living in unjust poverty and who are in urgent need of care. Everyone who works on board and everyone who services the ships are all volunteers, from carpenters to chefs, seafarers to surgeons, teachers to technicians, nurses to hairdressers!! Every profession you would find in a village can be found among Mercy Ship volunteers and over half of the skilled roles are not medical. Each year, more that 2,000 volunteers from over 60 nations serve onboard the ships and they fly the flag of each nation on the ship! They are always looking for volunteers and funding.

Ruth introduced us to many of the children and adults who have been treated on the ships, many of the patients will have walked over 100 miles to get to the port where the ships have docked. Patients present various conditions which require treatment from different areas of medicine from Maxillofacial (Cysts, plastic surgery, cleft lips or burns), Orthopaedic (malnutrition, muscle contraction and bowed legs, etc), Obstetric Fistula (injuries from childbirth, pain, incontinence - that results in that person being rejected from their village), General Surgery, Ophthalmic Surgery (cataracts, etc), Dental Surgery to Palliative care (where the support is often to help the families find an alternative income stream).

One amazing surgeon has spent many years working voluntarily on the ships. He is sponsored by a Church in America. He met his wife on board and their 2 children are now involved in the wonderful work that their parents do! Often the volunteers have their families with them and there is a school on board each ship to enable families to stay together whilst parents work. There are 15 hundred volunteers working on each ship, doing 200 different jobs on board. Some local staff are paid.

Whilst the ships are docked they work with locals to train and mentor healthcare professionals and build a stronger medical service in the locality. Teams go out and refurbish or renovate outdated or unhygienic facilities taking with them equipment and medical supplies. They also help to set up convalescent centres called HOPE centres. They work with farmers as well to encourage them to grow crops that are nutritious and will also be good crops to sell and create an income. So Mercy Ships make a lasting impact long after the ships depart.

Since 1978 when Don and Deyon Stephens had a vision to take world-class health care, medical facilities, equipment, supplies and skilled surgeons to places that need help the most, they have performed 105,000+ life changing surgeries, visited 56 developing

nations, trained 49,000+ local healthcare professionals and mobilised 2,500+ volunteers every year, bringing life changing medical care and hope to everyone they care for.

Ruth's inspiring talk created a lot of discussion amongst us as we celebrated our 79th Anniversary with cake and a glass of bubbly.

Our next meeting will take place on Wednesday 9th April at 7.30 for 7.45 start, in St Dominick Parish Hall and our talk is entitled The Voyage of the Mayflower with Mike Haywood. 




### **April Gardening Notes**

Things really get going in the garden this month with a mixture of warm sunny days and April showers which should make for some ideal growing conditions, but still watch out for frosts and keep any tender plants under cover until the risk of frost has passed.

Towards the end of the month, it should be safe to sow the seeds of half hardy summer bedding plants such as marigolds and



petunias but only plant them out when the days and nights warm up. Hardy annuals and wild flower seed mixes can be sown outdoors now.

April is still not too late to prune any climbing or rambling roses that you may have and it's also a good idea to mulch around roses and shrubs in general with a layer of organic matter. This will help to retain moisture during any future dry spells that we might have and also help to supress weeds.

If possible try to get the remainder of your seed potatoes planted by the end of the month and then, hopefully, they will be ready for harvesting before the dreaded blight gets around. If your first early potataoes begin to show through remember to keep them earthed up to protect from frost. Also you can sow crops such as carrots, parsnips, beetroot and cabbage directly into the soil.

Peas can also be sown directly into the ground but if mice have been proven to be a pest in the past foraging on the seeds it would better to sow them in pots or modules and then plant them as proper plants. (this would also apply to sweet peas).

In the green house seeds for summer bedding plants such as marigolds, asters and clary can be sown as well as salad crops and peppers, melons, squashes, courgettes, pumpkins and the like. Cuttings of flower plants such as chrysanthemums can be taken and grown on to give a flower display in late summer/early autumn. As the days warm up it may be necessary to apply some shading to the greenhouse, also ensure that there is sufficient ventilation which will also allow pollinating insects to enter.

Now is a good time to begin to make your own organic liquid fertilizer by adding plant material to a butt of rainwater and allowing it to soak for a few weeks. The resulting liquid can be diluted and used as a liquid plant feed. Almost any green vegetation such as weeds, grass cuttings, cabbage leaves and kitchen peelings can be used for this but nettles and comfrey are particularly good.

If you have a wildlife pond try to avoid removing excess weed and algae until frogs, toads and newts have finished spawning and also ensure that there is a route for amphibians to enter and exit safely to escape into the surrounding cover when necessary.

When out in your garden be on the lookout for summer visiting birds, such as swallows and house martins. When you see these

you can be sure that spring has arrived. As ever, continue to garden with nature and wildlife in mind.

Also, please remember the annual plant sale in May where they are always glad of any spares you have, phone numbers in the separate article, also think about what you might enter in the Autumn show in September. Its not too early to start planning your entries. You can even sit in your lovely garden and knit – as long as no one can see you from the road!



#### Parish council report March 2025


The start time of this meeting had been brought forward to 6.30 and although advertised on social media the general public hadn't seen it. Anyway, we started at 6.30 because it was St Piran's evening and someone must have wanted to get to the pub, I'm not actually sure who that was. I might be wrong but I think there were only two Cornish people present, I was one and I'm guessing Councillor Hunn was the other but I might be wrong.

There was no one there for the public session.

So, we went in and there was Councillor Long's face on a large video screen, he'd been called away for work but wanted to give an update on things and was just reminding everyone he would be standing for re-election in May in case they might forget. He reported the Meadows planning application had been turned down this time, the one that's been ongoing for years. He also reported the really bad footpath at Dillets was not considered to be bad enough yet and was to go under a six monthly review, there was no update on the Tamar Bridge works and the council

has no money so we have no bus stop markings. (Buses?)! Councillor Wilkins asked him a question about Voneous, which he had to do by leaving his seat and addressing the screen, as they do on Doctor Who sometimes. I can't remember the question, nor answer, but Wildanet are around now. Best go to one of Andrew's surgeries at the village shop to ask him.

Then he was turned off and went to have his tea.



Then the public arrived. A member of the public had come to thank both Andrew Long and the parish council with regard to the planning refusal, so that was duly noted. Another couple came with regard to their planning application which was discussed, and the agenda continued, quite quickly actually because of the pub.

Councillor Greene wants a flagpole but didn't have any costs so that was deferred, the Dilletts footpath was talked about, they wondered if a volunteer could trip up and apparently the last parishioner who fell on it has photos.

The chairman even said "chop chop" at one point to hurry things along!

The speeding figures will be produced next time, maybe.

The ROSPA report is due. The gates aren't closing properly, Councillor Fry said he will have a look at them sometime soon. But, guess what, he's done the goalposts and the children are allegedly delighted with them. But, councillor Heslop thought they were in the wrong place, not as agreed, actually it's been talked about for so long I don't think anyone could remember where they should/shouldn't have gone

Councillor Wilkins asked for it to be made clear that people could still enter the football field through the side gate to play on the swings without paying to watch the football when there was a match, so that was alright. They've been allowing that for the last 100 years so no reason to change I don't suppose.

Then we had a hold up, the general public saw their chance and left. The parish hall committee have been discussing, at length, for a few years the shutters into the kitchen, which are not fire proof and are a bit heavy and there have been complaints/rumblings over the years that people can't all manage them. They are going to be costly to replace with anything suitable. So, as the parish council give grants, they asked if they might have some help. Well, that set the ball rolling. "Why did they want to do that, it was too much money" etc. Someone on the council, who is on

the hall committee, asked why was it so expensive, having sat through hall meetings for months. Anyway, members of the hall committee who were on the parish council i.e., Cox, Wenmoth and Greene had to leave the room and go into the kitchen out of earshot.

The remaining members got out of their seats and tried to open the shutters to see how heavy they were- no they didn't. The result was a bit like "Dragon's Den", they could have some of the money but the council would rather give them money towards the car park outside. i.e., they like car drivers, but not elderly, disabled or vertically challenged people.

It seems everyone's given up on chasing Cornwall Council who took away the car park surface by mistake.

In last month's Parish News there was a form to fill in, if there is more than one of you in your household you can copy it off as you might not all agree. Please try to do it. There is to be a council

election, all councillors have to stand down and apply for re-election, I think by 4.00 on 2<sup>nd</sup> April, hopefully some of you have applied. If there are not enough candidates there is no election, there isn't usually. It would be nice if someone applied who had actually been to a meeting, but they will soon learn.
